

Con Corazón Outreach Report

25th May 2023 – Marampaqui

This is the second time we have visited the Pacchanta village and we noticed that the health need is also in high demand. We have become a mobile clinic, and with the coordination of local authorities, we can carry out our activities as normal. The equipment, instruments, materials and medicines are transported in the car along with the entire Con Corazón team.

On this occasion, children were protagonists as patients. It is winter and respiratory diseases increase. Cough, flu and fever are the common denominator at this stage of the year. On the other hand, we are glad for the concern of the parents, who upon learning of our presence, came to us with their children to receive the treatment that corresponds to them.

In the next campaign in June, we will return to Marampaqui to continue our service. Frequently, many of the inhabitants of Pacchanta come walking between 2.5 to 3 hours to Marampaqui to receive medical-dental care. That was one of the reasons that encouraged us to bring health, this time to this village.



Activities

Medicine, we have seen 25 patients. Dentist, 11 patients Laboratory, 07 lab tests were done. Health promotion for all our patients.
